What IS Solid Waste Exactly? (BMP 306)

 Generally speaking, solid waste is any solid, liquid or gas that is no longer fit for its intended use or no longer has value (see 49-701.01 for state regulatory definition).

Solid waste must be managed according to state and federal rules; however, there are several exemptions to this definition that alter how some materials must be managed (i.e. hazardous or radioactive wastes).

In addition, there are solid waste subgroups that require special handling (i.e. used oil or used tires).

- Just because something is a solid waste doesn't mean that it can be thrown into the trash.
- Morenci is committed to recycling as much of its waste as possible.
- Paper, cardboard, and aluminum cans are examples of items that are recycled to reduce the volume of material going to the landfill.

What Should <u>NEVER</u> be Thrown into the Trash?

E-Waste	Used Oil, Grease, & Antifreeze	Fluorescent & Mercury- Containing Lamps	Pallets & Large Pieces of Wood
Drums	Aerosol Cans	Spent Lead Anodes	Used Light Vehicle Tires
Batteries	Lead Flake	HDPE/LDPE	Rubber Hose with Grease
Scrap Metal	Paints	Scrap Conveyor Belt	Railroad Ties

These items can NOT be disposed of at the Loma Linda landfill.

Where does all the Trash GO?



All garbage dumpsters and garbage cans/drums located around the mine, in Morenci and at the Townsite Transfer Station ultimately go to the municipal solid waste landfill, which is located ~8 miles southeast of Clifton at the Greenlee County

The Townsite Transfer Station (BMP 329) is used for handling / temporarily storing solid waste for the primary purpose of transporting that solid waste to either a recycling facility or the local landfill.





The Greenlee County landfill is **NOT** designed to accept hazardous waste. Therefore, if inappropriate materials make their way into a dumpster, the responsible department or shop will need to remove the inappropriate materials from the dumpster.
